Monday, May 8, 2017
Meeting Minutes

Call to Order and Pledge Allegiance - Chair Matthew Prochaska called the meeting to order at 3:16p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: Member Gilmour, Member Prochaska, Member Hendrix and Member Purcell were present. **With four members present voting aye, a quorum was determined to conduct business.**

Committee Members Absent: Tony Giles

Others Present: Sheriff Dwight Baird, Public Defender Vicky Chuffo, EMA Director Joe Gillespie, Undersheriff Harold Martin, Judge Timothy McCann, Commander Mike Peters, Coroner Jacquie Purcell, Facilities Director Jim Smiley, Court Services Director Tina Varney, State's Attorney Eric Weis

Approval of the Agenda – Member Hendrix made a motion to approve the agenda, second by Member Gilmour. **With four members present in agreement with the amendment, the motion carried.**

Approval of Minutes – Member Hendrix made a motion to approve the April 10, 2017 Law, Justice and Legislation Committee Meeting Minutes, second by Member Purcell. **With four members present in agreement, the motion carried.**

Public Comment – None

- ❖ **Coroner** – Jacquie Purcell reported 22 total deaths for the month of April, with 21 due to natural causes and 1 classified as other. Written report submitted.
- ❖ **Circuit Clerk** – Ms. Ingemunson stated that their numbers continue to decrease, but are on track with last year. Written report submitted.
- ❖ **Courthouse** – Judge Timothy McCann introduced Michelle DelMuro, the Drug Court Coordinator. Judge McCann also invited the committee to the Kendall County Chiefs of Police Law Enforcement Memorial for a brief National Police Week memorial service honoring fallen officers on Wednesday, May 17th at 11:30a.m. at the memorial near the front entrance.
- ❖ **Court Services** – Written report provided. Ms. Varney informed the committee that Kendall County will be hosting the Probation Leadership Workshop on June 5 & 6, 2017 at the Courthouse, and said that a National Leader will be the primary presenter for the two-day event.

- ❖ **EMA** – Director Joe Gillespie reported the County received very positive reviews from FEMA and Homeland Security following the recent Dresden Drill.

Deputy Commander Gillespie said there were representatives from the Coroner’s Office, the Highway Department, the Sheriff’s Office, the Health Department and the County Board in attendance during the drill.

- ❖ **KenCom** – Report not provided

- ❖ **Public Defender** – Vicky Chuffo provided a written report and stated that their caseloads continue to increase in every area.

- ❖ **State’s Attorney** – Eric Weis reminded the committee about the Open Meetings Act training being held on May 18, 2017 at 6:00p.m. in the Jury Assembly Room.

- ❖ **Sheriff’s Report**

- a. **Operations Division** – Written report provided. Commander Peters was pleased to report that the Bike Deputies began patrolling again recently, and that the Sheriff’s Office has received positive feedback and reviews about the patrol from County citizens. The bike patrols are predominantly in the Boulder Hill area.

- b. **Corrections Division** – Written report provided. Undersheriff Martin stated there are currently 88 inmates, 82 from outside of the County, 10 federal inmates and 60 in County inmates.

Undersheriff Martin also reported that the Sex Offender Registration program is going well, with Deputy Thompson, the Deputy in Charge, conducting constant offender checks and obtaining ongoing training.

- c. **Records Division** – Written report provided

Old Business - None

New Business

- **Approval of Amendment to Drug Court Agreement** – Michelle DelMuro, Drug Court Coordinator briefed the committee on the reasoning for the amendment to the current agreement. Judge McCann said the funding for this program comes directly from the State of Illinois. Motion made by Member Gilmour, second by Member Hendrix to forward the item to the County Board for Approval. **With four members in agreement, the motion carried.**
- **Court Security Fee Update** – Sheriff Baird stated that Court Security fees have not been updated or increased in 10 years. Sheriff Baird said that current fees being charged are substantially lower than fees charged by surrounding Counties. Member Hendrix noted

that there is a \$600,000 deficit between revenues, fees and expenses. Member Prochaska asked the committee to review the documents, and the item will be discussed further at the June meeting to determine if there should be an increase in fees, and if the item should then be forwarded to the County Board for approval.

- *Approval to rejoin Metro Counties in an amount not to exceed \$2500.* – Member Prochaska reported that the County Board Chairman would like to re-establish the Counties membership with Metro Counties that the County had several years ago. **There was consensus by the Committee that this item should go to the Finance Committee for review at the May 25th meeting.**
- *Approval of Kendall County Federal Legislative Priorities* – After discussion, Member Prochaska asked committee members to review the document and to make suggestions to him for revamping. Item to be discussed at the June meeting.

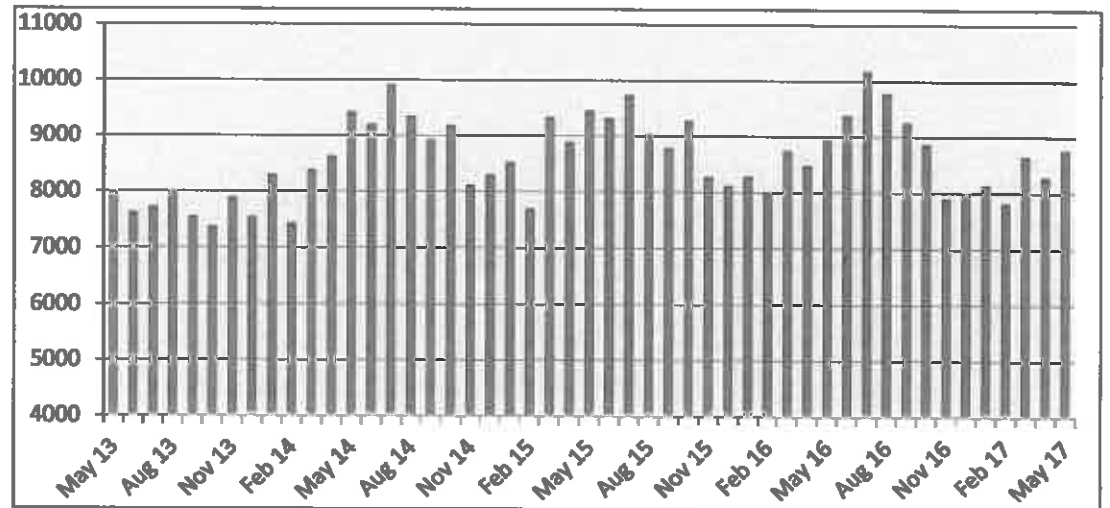

Kendall County Buy-in Costs for New World CAD;

Standard Mobile licenses (this will replace our current vendor INFOR/Mobile CAD)

Field Based Reporting: This will allow the Deputies to start the report from their vehicle utilizing the information from New World CAD. It will merge the data from CAD into the report headers. Supervisors will be able to review and approve or require that the report be modified, and then Records will be able to verify the information and merge it into the RMS. Some highlights on how this will enhance the Sheriff's Office operation are:

- Reduce errors – all mandated fields will need to be completed and records will not have to interpret poor penmanship.
- Keep the Deputies in their assigned areas; this will reduce the amount of time that they will need to complete reports at the PSC or a substation.
- Provide Deputies with RMS information during investigations from all participating agencies, to include booking photographs.
- Reduce the amount of data entry required by records clerks. The time for entering each category each month, has been estimated as;
 - Report Headers – 124 hours (this is estimated to take about 1/5th the time with field based reporting.
 - Stop Cards – 24 hours
 - The following licenses are not part of the current package, but may be available in the future
 - Tickets – 17 hours
 - Crash Reports – 40 hours

These licenses are expected to be paid upon the contract being signed by KenCom, and our reimbursement to KenCom would be due at a mutually agreed upon time. Additional hardware will not need to be paid until it is ordered. (These prices may change slightly, after the next KENCOM finance committee meeting)

UCCI LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

May 19, 2017

Counties Code

HB 2591 – Court Fee Distribution Schedules

House Bill 2591 creates the Criminal and Traffic Assessment Act. This new Act identifies costs, fees, and surcharges across several statutes that courts are authorized to impose upon defendants and compiles those into new schedules of assessments. Courts are authorized to impose a schedule of assessment on a defendant, and the schedule provides for the distribution of the proceeds from the costs, fees, and surcharges between a county, its departments, and other entities and funds. House Bill 2591 has passed out of committee and advanced to debate on the floor of the House of Representatives. House Bill 2591 remains in the House Rules Committee. The Bill could still advance, but would require additional procedural steps to do so.

Members are encouraged to review the amendment to this bill, as the bill reduces the proceeds all entities receive from these legal proceedings.

HB 3150 – County Recorder Fraud Referral and Review

Section 3-5010.5 of the Counties Code recognizes that property fraud, including fraudulent filings intended to cloud or fraudulently transfer title to property by recording false or altered documents and deeds, is a rapidly growing problem throughout the State. In order to combat the problem of these fraudulent filings, a recorder is authorized to establish a process to review and refer documents suspected to be fraudulent to an administrative law judge for review. The statute also sets forth the referral and review process requirements. Currently, Section 3-5010.5 is scheduled to be repealed on June 1, 2018. **House Bill 3150** removes the repeal date of June 1, 2018. The Bill has passed out of the House and is currently in the Senate.

UPDATE: House Bill 3150 has advanced to Third Reading for final approval in the Senate.

Freedom of Information Act

HB 2703 – Removal of Risk Management FOIA Exemption

House Bill 2703 deletes the provision in FOIA that exempts from disclosure any and all proprietary information and records related to the operation of an intergovernmental risk management association or self-insurance pool or jointly self-administered health and accident cooperative or pool and insurance or self-insurance (including any intergovernmental risk management association or self-insurance pool) claims, loss or risk management information, records, data, advice or communications. Removing the exemption and requiring production of this information would give requesters, plaintiffs, and claimants a distinct advantage over the pools and their participants. With that information, claimants and plaintiffs

would be in a position to know exactly how much money was available to pay their claim, the cost of defending their claim, and/or what the same type of claim had settled for in the past. This would threaten the continued viability of these local government pools, which have been able to offer cost-effective risk and worker's compensation solutions to units of local government when other providers could not. House Bill 2703 passed out of committee in its introduced form on a 17-11 vote and advanced to debate on the floor of the House of Representatives.

House Floor Amendment No. 1 was introduced April 24, 2017 and recommended for adoption by the House Labor & Commerce Committee, but has not been acted upon by the full House.

UPDATE: House Bill 2703 was placed on Second Reading on May 18, 2017 and the Bill's deadline for final action was extended to May 26, 2017. Additionally, House Floor Amendment No. 2 was filed on May 18, 2017 and has been referred to the House Labor & Commerce Committee. Amendment No. 2, like Amendment No.1, (1) abandons the removal of the exemption from FOIA and (2) subjects annual audited financial reports and statements of actuarial opinion that are required to be filed with the Department of Insurance by joint insurance pools to be subject to inspection and copying pursuant to FOIA. In addition to those changes, Amendment No. 2 adds that "The governing board of the joint insurance pool shall not include a member or trustee who is not a representative of a member of the pool. Members or trustees of the governing board shall not have a direct or indirect financial interest in any contract or subcontract entered with the pool." Amendment No. 2 also requires a pool that offers workers' compensation coverage to provide any member of that pool, who makes a request, with the bylaws of the pool, articles of incorporation, and any contract entered into by the pool; however, any document received by a member of the pool becomes subject to FOIA. Amendment No. 2 include a list of information that must be included in a report to the Director of Insurance (which will be subject to FOIA), but the information required is far less than required by Amendment No. 1 and less likely to result in disclosure of proprietary information. Finally, administrators of such pools must be licensed under particular provisions of the Illinois Insurance Code.

Public Officer Prohibited Activities Act

HB 169 – County Board Member as Public Administrator/Guardian

House Bill 169 previously only made a technical change to the Public Officer Prohibited Activities Act. As amended, the Bill expands the scope of offices a County Board Member may simultaneously hold to include public administrator or public guardian as provided in Section 13-1 of the Probate Act of 1975.

UPDATE: On May 15th, the Bill was placed on Third Reading for final approval in the Senate.

Public Officer Simultaneous Tenure Act

SB 923 – Simultaneous Tenure as County Board member and Township Supervisor or Township Trustee

Currently, it is lawful to be a county board member and a township supervisor and, in counties of less than 100,000 population, a county board member and township trustee. Senate Bill 923 provides that it is unlawful for any person to simultaneously hold the office of county board member and township supervisor or township trustee. The Bill also provides that it is unlawful for any person to simultaneously hold the office of a county board member and a township assessor or town clerk. Additionally, the Bill validates lawful actions of individuals who were previously allowed to simultaneously hold the specified offices before the effective date of this amendatory Act. However, any actions in violation of the provisions of this Act after the effective date of this amendatory act are unlawful.

Senate Floor Amendment Number 2, filed on April 4, 2017, expands the scope of the introduced Bill by providing that “it is unlawful for a person to hold an office in a unit of local government with a salary, a stipend, or benefits in a combined amount that exceeds \$10,000 and also hold the office of county board member, township supervisor, township trustee, township assessor, or township clerk simultaneously.” In other words, it is the compensation of the other office(s) rather than the compensation for county board member that determines whether a simultaneous tenure is impermissible. The statutory language does not require that the official receive the salary, stipend, or benefit, only that the office is entitled to that benefit. This prohibition would be in addition to the prohibitions contained in the Public Officer Prohibited Activities Act (50 ILCS 105/1) against a county board member holding other offices as well as the doctrine of (in)compatibility of offices discussed in case law and Attorney General Opinions. The amendment would allow those who simultaneously hold the covered offices at the effective date of the Bill to complete their terms.

UPDATE: Senate Bill 923 remains on Third Reading in the Senate, but the deadline for the Bill’s passage out of the Senate is May 31, 2017.

Revenue

SB 2199 – Reduction in Local Distributions

Senate Bill 2199 amends several taxation statutes with the effect of reducing the amount transferred from the State General Revenue Fund to the Local Government Distributive Fund by 25% as well as reducing the monthly deposits into the Local Government Tax Fund, the County and Mass Transit District Fund, and the State and Local Sales Tax Reform Fund by 20%. Each of these funds are critical sources of revenue for units of local government like counties. The reductions are set to begin July 1, 2017, which would be in the middle of the county budget year. A hearing on the Bill was set for the Senate Revenue Committee on Wednesday, May 10, 2017.

UPDATE: No action was taken either in Senate Revenue Committee or otherwise. Because Senate Bill 2199 did not pass out of the chamber of origination by the extended May 12, 2017 deadline, it has been automatically re-referred to the Senate Assignments Committee. The Bill could still advance, but would require additional procedural steps to do so.

SB 42 – FY 2017 & 2018 Budget Implementation Bill (Reduction in Local Gov. Dist. Fund)

Senate Bill 42 contains extensive provisions related to the finances of the state and its contributions to local government. In particular, the Bill contains reductions to the state's contributions to the Local Government Distributive Fund. "Beginning with the first day of the first month beginning after the effective date [of the Bill] and continuing through June 30, 2017, the Treasurer shall transfer each month from the General Revenue Fund to the Local Government Distributive Fund an amount equal to the sum of (i) 6.02% (previously 9.23%) (10% of the ratio of the 3% individual income tax rate prior to 2011 to the 4.95% (previously 3.25%) individual income tax rate beginning in 2017) of the net revenue realized from the tax imposed upon individuals, trusts, and estates during the preceding month and (ii) 6.86% (10% of the ratio of the 4.8% corporate income tax rate prior to 2011 to the 7% corporate income tax rate beginning in 2017) of the net revenue realized from the tax imposed upon corporations during the preceding month (previously 10%). From July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018 the rates would decrease to (i) 5.45% of the net revenue realized from the tax imposed upon individuals, trusts, and estates during the preceding month and (ii) 6.17% of the net revenue realized from the tax imposed upon corporations during the preceding month. Beginning July 1, 2018 and thereafter the rates would increase to (i) 7.6% and (ii) 8.7% respectively. The Bill also reflects or hints at changing tax rates (4.95% individual income tax rate beginning in 2017; 7% corporate income tax rate beginning in 2017; 3.75% individual income tax rate beginning in 2022; 5.2% corporate income tax rate beginning in 2022)

Senate Bill 42 failed to pass the Senate by a vote of 27-24-5 on May 17, 2017. A motion to reconsider has been filed, and this Bill is expected to return to the floor for a second attempt at passage, mostly likely in a revised form.

Stormwater Management

SB 1337 – Stormwater Management Plans

The Counties Code currently only allows certain counties to adopt stormwater management plans. **Senate Committee Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1337** amends Section 5-1062.2 of the Code to grant authority to adopt stormwater management plans to all counties not granted authority under Section 5-1062 or Section 5-1062.3 of the Code.

UPDATE: Senate Bill 1337 has been the subject of several amendments, which are outlined below. The Bill is currently on Third Reading with the deadline for the Bill's passage out of Senate extended to May 31, 2017.

Senate Amendment No. 2 replaces the entire content of the Bill with revisions to Sections 5-1062, 5-1062.2, and 5-1062.3. Section 5-1062 is amended so as to affect the area served by the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning rather than the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission. Section 5-1062.2 is amended so as to affect all counties containing all or part of an urbanized area (previously just Madison, St. Clair, Monroe, Kankakee, Grundy, LaSalle, DeKalb, Kendall, and Boone) as well as those counties where the question of establishing a stormwater management planning council was submitted to and approved by a majority of the electors voting on the question. The makeup of a stormwater management planning committee is modified to include members representing drainage districts and soil

and water conservation districts except in the counties previously named. Moreover, any referendum to increase or decrease the tax for stormwater purposes must be conducted at a general election. Section 5-1062.3 continues to apply to DuPage and Peoria counties only.

In each section mentioned above, the Bill, as amended, defines urban flooding and urbanized areas and authorizes grants to (1) units of local government; (2) not-for-profit organizations; and (3) landowners who are members of the FEMA National Flood Insurance Program. Municipal recipients must also have adopted a stormwater management plan.

Senate Amendments No. 3 and 4 amend the Bill as amended by Senate Amendment No. 2. Both amendments would require that before a county identified in section 5-1062.2 submits a referendum to the electors for approval of an annual tax for stormwater purposes, that County must (1) adopt and enforce a floodplain management ordinance; and (2) designate a certified floodplain manager. Counties must maintain both requirements in order to levy annually.

HB 2756 – County Stormwater Management

House 2756 is very similar to Senate Bill 1337. In its current form, the Bill amends Section 5-1062, 5-1062.2, and 5-1062.3 of the Counties Code, which govern stormwater management in the respective counties set forth in each Section. The purpose of these Sections is to allow management and mitigation of the effects of urbanization on stormwater drainage with an emphasis on the use of cost-effective, nature-based solutions to flooding problems. A countywide plan for the management of stormwater is required to be prepared in the separate sections. In each amended section, the Bill provides that the committee may make grants to: (1) units of local government; (2) not-for-profit organizations; and (3) landowners. A municipal recipient of grant moneys must be a member in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's National Flood Insurance Program and have adopted an ordinance requiring actions consistent with the stormwater management plan. Additionally, "urban flooding" and "urbanized areas" are both defined in each of the three sections.

Section 5-1062 is modified so that it applies only to the metropolitan counties located in the area served by the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning. Section 5-1062.2 is amended so as to extend its applicability to all counties containing all or part of an urbanized area, except those in the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, as well as those counties where the question of establishing a stormwater management planning council was submitted to and approved by a majority of the electors voting on the question. The Bill provides for representatives of drainage districts and soil and water conservation districts to be represented on the stormwater management planning committee; however, Madison, St. Clair, Monroe, Kankakee, Grundy, LaSalle, DeKalb, Kendall, and Boone counties are not required to have drainage district or soil and water conservation representatives. Additionally, questions related to the levy of an annual tax for stormwater management purposes are required to be held at a general election. Section 5-1063 remains applicable to only DuPage and Peoria Counties.

House Bill 2756 passed out of the House on a vote of 100-11-0 and is currently in the Senate Committee on Assignments.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS FOR HIDEAWAY LAKES CAMP GROUND

Hideaway Lakes Camp Grounds

- Since the 15th of December 2015 until the 4th of August 2016, **145 calls for service** for the Sheriff's Office have occurred. From these calls, **53 reports have been taken** and 39 of those reports, and or in house records have indicated that an individual or individuals have permanent residence at the campground.
- Overview of types of call:
 - Several residential burglaries and burglaries
 - Numerous domestic violence issues and domestic batteries
 - Several possessions of controlled substances
 - Several ambulance assists/overdoses
 - Disorderly conduct
 - Warrant services
 - A criminal sexual assault
 - Contacts with registered sex offenders who reside and/or work for the campgrounds
 - Sex offender registration issues
 - Several lower level offenses including criminal damage to property, neighborhood trouble, disturbances, civil assists and animal complaints, etc.
- Additional concerns:
 - Ongoing issues with the septic and several complaints from residence related to these septic issues
 - From observations it has been noted there are unsafe conditions such as an uncovered man hole with no protection around it in July during the busy season
 - Owner Thomas Tanner has turned off power to campers for being late on their monthly rent
 - The Sheriff's Office has received an influx of desk reports from Hideaway Lakes residents. Residents have stated to deputies that Thomas Tanner has told them not to contact the Sheriff's Office for issues, and they are in fear of losing their residence if they do contact the police
 - Thomas Tanner has also openly stated he does not want Sheriff's Deputies within the campground as he feels it is bad for business
 - Several concerts from radio station Q101 have been hosted on the campground over the past several years (possible special use permit violation)
 - On 7/30/16 there was a jello-wrestling event/concert held at the campground that attracted approximately 1700 people, tickets were sold at \$25 each

Yogi Bear Campground (comparable property in Kendall County)

- Since the 15th of December 2015 until the 4th of August 2016, **20 calls for service** for the Sheriff's Office have occurred. From these calls, **3 reports have been taken**.
- Overview of types of calls:
 - 2 domestic battery
 - 1 citizen assist

Polish National Association (PNA) (comparable property in Kendall County)

- Since the 15th of December 2015 until the 4th of August 2016, **11 calls for service** for the Sheriff's Office have occurred. From these calls, **1 report has been taken**.
- Overview of types of call:
 - 1 suspended drivers license arrest

Oswego Fire Department issues and concerns:

- Keeping identified access points accessible – (back entrance /exit blocked off at times, several internal “streets” often purposely blocked with dropped trees)
- Identification of lots that are visible & identifiable from the “street” (as of June 8, 2016 Mr. Tanner had agreed to start installing signage indicating “lot ranges” at the roadside – don’t know if that has yet begun)
- Electrical wiring and non-compliant use of extension cords in the office & pavilion buildings (Office area has had most of these rectified as of 6/8/16, still working on pavilion building)
- Complaint Exit signage and locking mechanisms in pavilion
- Complaint storage of cylinders and LP in/around pavilion and office
- Continued work on removing abandoned vehicles/RVs/campers from the premises
- *Oswego Fire Department’s operational concerns include:*
 - “Campers” calling 911 and not having any idea where they are except at Hide Away Lakes
 - Learning via social media by mere chance of “Raves” or large concert weekends happening at the location – and even that isn’t as much of a problem except for historically these ‘events’ have a habit of resulting in EMS Issues out there as well
 - Not having first responders be met by campground “staff” to assist in determining location of emergency – especially in the evening/night
 - None of these issues should be new to Mr. Tanner as there has been some ongoing dialogue with him for a number of years now. Things get better, and then things start to slip again.

Illinois Secretary of State (SOS)

- SOS provided information of registered vehicles for 8045 Van Emmon Road the Hide Away Lakes Camp Grounds.
 - **Approximately 77 vehicles** have been registered to Hide Away Lakes that are not registered to the owner Thomas Tanner.
