CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Robyn Vickers at 8:34a.m.

With four members present, a quorum was determined for the conducting of committee business.

OTHERS PRESENT: Ariel Beauchamp, KC Soil & Water Education Coordinator; Steve Curatti, Kendall County Health Department Assistant Executive Director; Scott Koeppel, KC Administrator, and Alyse Olson, KC Soil & Water District Conservationist

APPROVAL OF AGENDA – Member Gilmour made a motion to approve the agenda, second by Member Gengler. **With four members present in agreement by roll call vote, the motion carried 4-0.**

STATUS REPORTS

- **Board of Health** – Robyn Vickers reported that she has been in attendance at two special meetings of the Board of Health in the past week, the City of Yorkville and other partners collaborating on the coordination of the Corona-19 Virus vaccine distribution in Kendall County. Member Vickers stated she was impressed by the work that has already been coordinated and at how efficiently everyone is working together with the vaccination process, vaccine scheduling, budget changes, and the County.
- **Health Department** – Steve Curatti updated the committee on the coordinated vaccine efforts, and stated they are still in Phase IA and doing a last call through media to ensure that all individuals in this phase are reached and vaccinated before moving on to Phase 1B. The Health Department has done approximately 500 first-round vaccinations thus far, and will follow-up with second vaccinations 28-days following. The Health Department has received two batches of the Moderna vaccine, and anyone receiving current vaccines must have the Moderna Covid-19 vaccine for the 2nd round as well. With the first shot, there is a 52 percent efficacy rate, and with the 2nd shot, there will be a 94-95 percent body efficacy rate.

Since Kendall County doesn't have a hospital, the Health Department has been able to jump right into mass distribution to **Phase 1A** eligible individuals including Nurses & Nursing Assistants, Physicians (MD, NP, PA), Respiratory Technicians, Pharmacists, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), including Fire Departments staff acting as EMS & Air Medical Transport (Rotor & Fixed Wing), COVID Sample Lab workers, Organ Harvesters & Students on Clinical Rotations. Other workers in settings at elevated risk, such as Environmental Services Staff, Reception Staff, X-Ray Technician's, Phlebotomists, Infectious Waste Workers, Dietary staff, Laundry staff, Security staff, Crisis Intervention staff, Interpreters, Clergy/pastoral/chaplains. Other non-healthcare personnel such as Clinicians, such as Nurses & Nursing Assistants, Physicians (MD, NP, PA), Respiratory Technicians, Dentists & Hygienists, Pharmacists, Plasma and Blood Donation staff, Morticians, Public Nurses, Home , Nurses, Optometrist, COVID Testing staff, Dermatologist, Dialysis staff, Urgent care workers, Corrections nurses/aids, Physical/occupation/speech therapists, Vaccine clinic workers, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), including Fire Departments staff acting as EMS & Air Medical Transport (Rotor & Fixed Wing) are also able to receive the vaccination as it becomes available for Phase 1A distribution.

Phase 1B eligible/qualified recipients will include Individual Age 65+, First responder (Includes Fire, Law Enforcement, 911 Workers, Security Personnel, Officers), Food and Agriculture (Includes Processing Plants, Veterinary, Livestock Services, and Animal Care), Corrections Workers and Inmates (Includes Prison/Jail Officers, Juvenile Facility Staff, Workers Providing In-Person Support, and Inmates), Public Transit Workers (Flight Crew, Drivers, Train Conductors, Drivers, Para-transit Drivers, In-Person Support, Ride Sharing Services), Shelters/Adult Day Care (Includes Homeless Shelters, Women's Shelters, Adult Day/Drop-in Programs, Sheltered Workshops, and Psycho-Social Rehab), Education (Includes Teachers, Principals, Student Support, Student Aids, Day Care Workers), Manufacturing (Includes Industrial Production of Goods for Distribution to Retail and Wholesale or other Manufacturers), United States Postal Services Workers, Grocery Workers (including Baggers, Cashiers, Stockers, Pick-up, and Customer Service).

Phase 1C will include persons aged 16-59 years old with medical conditions that increase the risk for severe Covid-19, including pregnancy, diabetes, pulmonary disease, heart conditions including hypertension, kidney disease, cancer, immunocompromised, obesity and sickle cell. Starting on Tuesday, January 12, 2021, the efforts will be shifted to just one mobile clinic location in Yorkville that will allow better flow, better through-put and collaborative efforts with the City of Yorkville, the Board of Health, the County Board and many others invested in the welfare of the County.

Mr. Curatti stated that Health Department personnel have been involved in the fight against the pandemic since March 2020, as well as continuing their daily work as follows:

- Environmental Health department personnel continue to conduct food, well and septic inspections
 - Community Health personnel are doing contact tracing for Covid-19, and continue with daily TB client observations, case management of lead-poisoning clients and in home lead-testing procedures
 - Mental Health department personnel are busy seeing new and existing clients affected by the pandemic, as well as seeing clients with other mental and behavioral health issues
 - Community Service staff is working with high risk pandemic isolated clients that need PPE supplies, as well as assisting with Covid testing and vaccination distribution throughout the County
- **Kendall County Soil and Water District** – Alyse Olson KCSWD Conservationist, introduced herself to the new County Board member, and shared insights into the work done by the District. Ms. Olson also reported that the KCSWD Annual meeting and Board elections for the Chair and Secretary/Treasurer position are tonight via Zoom at 6:00p.m. Contact the office for details.

Ariel Beauchamp, Education Coordinator explained her continued work on AG in the Classroom for 2nd grade classed throughout the County, and reported she is working on expansion plans to other grades interested. More details to come at future meetings.

Illinois Urban Manual



The Illinois Urban Manual (IUM) is a resource manual that includes best management practices related to soil erosion and sediment control, green infrastructure, stormwater management and special area protection. It is intended for individuals involved in land use planning, building site development, and natural resource conservation in rural and urban communities as well as developing areas. The IUM can be used as a guide to promote the protection of our land and water resources. New and updated standards are always being added to the manual. To view the Illinois Urban Manual along with associated standards, specifications, and the *IUM Field Manual for Inspection of Erosion & Sediment Control Best Management Practices* visit:

Partners for Conservation Program: Cost-Share Assistance Now Available

Interested in trying out cover crops to help manage nutrients, weeds, erosion and build soil health on your farm? Are you experiencing erosion on your cropland? Ever considered incorporating native plants into your landscape to attract pollinators?

Cost-share funds are available through the Partners for Conservation (PFC) Program at the Kendall County SWCD. The program is intended to help landowners who want to incorporate projects that conserve soil and protect water quality on their property but may need some technical and/or financial assistance to get the ball rolling. Eligible practices include:

- ◆ Water Well Sealing
- ◆ Grassed Waterways
- ◆ Filter Strips
- ◆ Pollinator Habitat
- ◆ Grade Stabilization Controls
- ◆ Nutrient Management
- ◆ Rain Gardens
- ◆ Cover Crops

Be sure to take advantage of available funds while they last. Cost-share rates are 75% of the estimated project cost (based off our current cost list for Kendall County). Questions? Contact the Kendall County SWCD office for details.

Partners for Conservation Program: Highlight

Cover Crops

Cover crops are plants that are seeded during times of the year when a harvestable crop is not being grown in order to improve soil health. They offer many benefits including controlling erosion, improving soil structure, increasing beneficial soil microbes and insects, maintaining soil moisture, and suppressing weeds. They are gaining popularity, locally, as a conservation practice to improve soil quality and water availability as well as for managing pests and nutrients on the farm. SWCD Updates and Resources

Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS) Update

Nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorous are necessary for plants and animals to survive, but when they occur in excess in our soil and water they are considered pollutants and can have negative impacts on aquatic ecosystems. Nutrients run off from urban and agricultural land. These are known as non-point sources because the exact source of the nutrient deposits can't be pin pointed. Nutrients also flow from wastewater treatment plants and other point

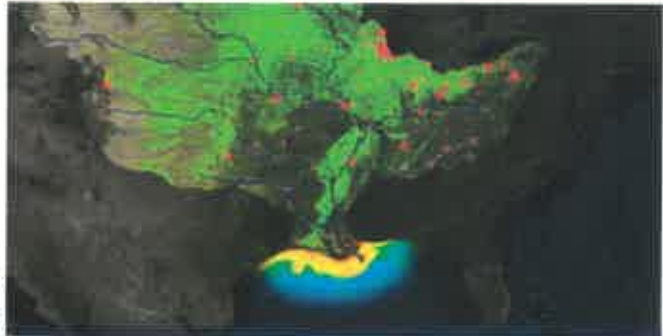


Image: Map illustrating the area that drains to the Gulf of Mexico and the "dead zone" resulting from nutrient runoff

sources where the exact source can be located. In Kendall County, these excess nutrients flow into creeks and streams, which connect to the Fox and Illinois Rivers. From there, they make their way to the Mississippi River and head south to the Gulf of Mexico. The excess nutrients that deposit into The Gulf create an environment for algae to thrive, which removes oxygen from the water that fish and other aquatic species rely on. This has created a "dead zone" in the Gulf of Mexico thousands of square miles wide where aquatic life cannot survive.

The Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy was first released in 2015 by the Illinois EPA and Department of Agriculture with the long-term goal of reducing nitrogen and phosphorous in Illinois waterways by 45%. The Strategy sets interim goals of reducing nitrogen in Illinois waters by 15% and phosphorous by 25% by the year 2025. Total phosphorous and total nitrogen discharge trends from point sources, such as wastewater treatment plants, are moving in the right direction. However, efforts are still needed to help reach our goals. The Kendall County SWCD is helping to reach these nutrient reduction goals by offering technical assistance as well as cost-share funds to landowners who want to incorporate conservation practices that reduce soil erosion & improve water quality on their property. Education Summer Programs and Updates

Kendall County Food Drive Contest

Kendall County Ag in the Classroom is having a food drive contest between all of the schools in the county. This food drive contest replaces the traditional spring poster contest to promote agriculture literacy in our students. This past year has been hard on many, with the pandemic, and have stressed food banks across the country. Food pantries generally struggle to maintain adequate supply in the summer months. This food drive will support the needs of the community, while also bringing together more community camaraderie and agriculture literacy to our students and the Kendall County public.

There are 3 categories for this food drive: One of high schools (Grades 9-12), middle schools (Grades 4-8), and elementary schools (Grades K-3). There will be a winner in each category. The school that has the most food per pound will win an agriculture themed movie party with local popcorn.

Community members can also participate by donating money on the fundraising platform Go Fund Me. The donations will be split between food banks to support buying from local farms.

Kendall County has 3 food pantries that together serve over 1,400 families each month. This food drive will benefit the 3 food pantries: Kendall County Community Food Pantry, Helmar Lutheran Church Pantry, and Harvest Baptist Food Pantry. The food drive collection is March 15th-19th. Schools have from February 1st-19th to sign up for participation. There is also a need for volunteers on March 19th to help pick up food to be weighed and distributed to the food pantries. 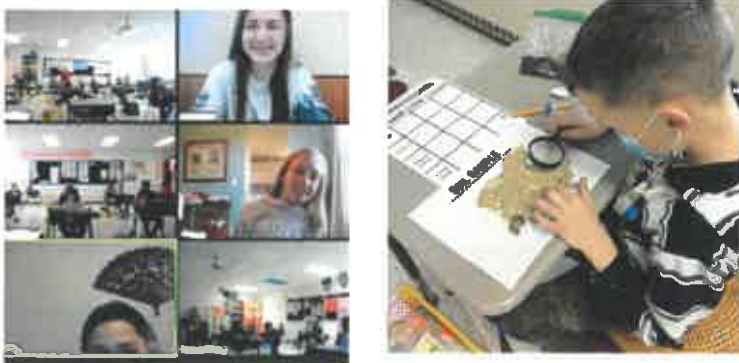

2020-2021 Classroom Programs

This school year has been a very different year for the Ag in the Classroom program. We have been fortunate to provide not 4, but 8 different lessons throughout the school year. So far we have done lessons on Apples, Pumpkins, Soil, and Evergreens. This Spring we will offer lessons on Erosion, Nutrition, Compost, and Water.

Classes are offered live virtually through Zoom or Google Classroom, as well as a video for each lesson for classes to do the lesson at their convenience. Videos are posted on our website. We have been fortunate to be able to provide these lessons to over 400 students each month. We have reached 1st-4th grade students, as well as, ESL students. During the thirty minute lesson, students are provided with information about lesson topics with a book, a video, a

short presentation, and/ or trivia. After the lesson they apply their learning with an activity.

Partner Updates: Natural Resources Conservation Service

In need of conservation assistance? The Yorkville Field Office is a great local resource containing a unique combination of partners ready to assist you including the Kendall County SWCD, USDA-NRCS and USDA-FSA. From providing technical assistance to financial program opportunities, be sure to connect with the office for your conservation needs.

Below are additional programs currently available through USDA that provide assistance to build soil health, address erosion on your cropland acres, create wildlife or pollinator habitat, incorporate cover crops, reduced tillage or nutrient management into your operation.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

EQIP allows you to address resource concerns through conservation practices and payment is provided based on each practice. Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis and cutoffs are provided during the fiscal year where applications received by that date are considered for available funding.

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

CSP helps you build on your existing conservation efforts while providing the opportunity to enhance your activities. Payment is provided for current stewardship activities already implemented on your farm and also for implementing new activities. Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis, just like with EQIP.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

CRP provides cost-share for installation of conservation practices along with an annual rental payment as well as additional incentives. Signup is currently open.

Did you Know??

- ◇ More than 20% of the worlds oxygen is produced by the Amazon rain forest.
- ◇ More than 180 million Americans receive quality drinking water from forested watersheds.
- ◇ Surfaces shaded by trees may be 20-45 degrees F cooler than unshaded areas.
- ◇ One large tree can provide a days supply of oxygen for up to 4 people.
- ◇ Trees increase property value. It has been studied that homes with mature trees sell for over \$7 thousand dollars more money and typically also quicker time frames, compared to properties with out established trees.
- ◇ Trees help reduce crime. There is less graffiti, vandalism and littering in outdoor spaces with trees compared to plant free spaces.
