Tour of the Fern Dell School

Attendees and Commissioners toured the Fern Dell School starting at 6:05 p.m.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Jeff Wehrli called the meeting to order at the Fern Dell Museum at 6:29 p.m.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Member Flowers made a motion, seconded by Member Bernacki, to approve the agenda as presented. With a voice vote of four (4) ayes, the motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Member Flowers made a motion, seconded by Member Bernacki, to approve the minutes from the June 21, 2022, meeting. With a voice vote of four (4) ayes, the motion carried.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Wehrli thanked Fern Dell for hosting. He explained the purpose of the meeting and noted the County's heritage.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Todd Milliron suggested having a local tractor show/parade.

NEW/OLD BUSINESS

Nomination of Officers for 2022-2023

Member Flowers, seconded by Member Shanahan, nominated Member Bernacki to the position of Secretary. There were no additional nominations.

Member Bernacki, seconded by Member Shanahan, nominated Member Flowers to the position of Vice-Chair. There were no additional nominations.

The votes on the nominations will occur at the September meeting.

Discussion of Historic Survey Project and Request for Volunteers-Ken Itle from WJE

Ken Itle from Wiss, Janney, Elstner Associates, Inc. presented information on the historic structure survey. He explained the project and plans to start the project in September. He discussed the source material for the survey. He also discussed the field work aspect of the project and the use of volunteers.

Lyon Farm has histories of many families and farms.

Mr. Itle discussed the deliverable from the project.

The survey teams will be one (1) person from WJE and one (1) volunteer. Surveys usually occur during the week, but can happen on a weekend. He plans to survey fifteen (15) to twenty (20) sites per day. Interested parties should reach out to Mr. Itle or Mr. Asselmeier. There would be a training session in September.

Mr. Asselmeier will do an email blast to the email list.

Mr. Itle explained that the project is funded through a Certified Local Government Grant. He explained how the grant was funded.

Chairman Wehrli explained the plan to survey the other townships.

Mr. Itle said that he would use archival photos as available. He discussed how he determines the dates of photos.

There were about two hundred forty (240) sites to examine.

Mr. Itle said that he attempts to track where structures use to be located.

Kendall Township would be surveyed first.

Mr. Itle hopes to pick a date in September for the training.

Concerns were expressed that some families would not be available in September due to harvesting.

Discussion of Cemeteries

Chairman Wehrli provided an update on the Commission's work, but the Commission has not put anything together at this time. The cemeteries have been identified. Lisa Wolancevich said the Elmer Dixon at Lyon Farm has that information. Johanna Byram discussed a group that identified veterans buried in Oswego.

Updates from Historic Preservation Groups

Mike Bortal, Plainfield Historic Preservation Commission, discussed having a CAMP organized hosted by the National Alliance of Preservation Commissioners. They would finance the CAMP through a Certified Local Government Grant with financial assistance from local Certified Local Governments. He discussed previous CAMPs and how CAMPs work. The grant would be applied for in 2022 and the CAMP would occur in 2023. He requested that the Kendal County Historic Preservation Commission let him know, if the Commission was interested in participating. He also provided information on the Bronk Farm. He also discussed a rehabilitation grant in Plainfield for historic properties.

Susan Kritzberg, Chapel on the Green, introduced Chapel on the Green representatives in attendance. She discussed their wedding business. They were working on a Network to Freedom grant.

Marilynn Thompson, Fern Dell, welcomed everyone to the Museum. She discussed their fundraising activities and history of the organization. She introduced several board members in attendance. She discussed activities at the Fern Dell School. She discussed the importance of getting new people involved. She discussed their plat book collection. She thanked everyone for attending the meeting.

Discussion occurred about educating children on the history of the area.

Subash George, Oswego Preservation Commission, also discussed the importance of educating children. He talked about partnering with the school district.

Jeanne Valentine, Plano Historical Society, was close to getting a location. She hoped that having a location will add new life to the organization.

Lisa Wolancevich, Kendall County Historical Society, introduced members of the Society in attendance. She discussed the repairs to roofs on several buildings at Lyon Farm. She discussed the literary events at the Society. She discussed the issues with the Illinois Department of Transportation regarding the expanding of Route 71. She noted the donation from the Elmer Dixon estate; there will be celebration of life for Elmer Dixon and his wife this fall at Lyon Farm. Their Fall Festival is September 24, 2022, and car show on September 25, 2022, with tractors. She requested attendees to submit names of families or notable citizens to celebrate at the Fall Festival.

Susan Kritzberg, Chapel on the Green, stated they also received a donation from the Elmer Dixon estate and they were planning an event for the fall of 2022 to honor Mr. Dixon.

Jane Burke, Naperville Preservation, discussed the mission of her organization. She discussed a CAMP training that she previously attended. She discussed the cataloguing for the first commercial residential subdivision in Naperville. She also discussed two (2) threatened structures in DuPage County.

Janet Blue and Bev Casey, Millington Historical Society, discussed the mission of their organization and their veterans' wall. They discussed the importance of networking and promoting through Facebook.

As part of an effort to identify former business occupants in buildings in Yorkville, a request was made for phone books from the 1990s.

Discussion occurred about notifying the libraries and the other museums about collections at the various museums.

Jane Burke discussed the Suburban Preservation Alliance meeting, sponsored by Landmarks Illinois, which will be held on September 17, 2022, in Naperville. She will send information to Mr. Asselmeier.

Subash George said the Oswego Historic Preservation Commission was looking for members.

Discussion of Upcoming Meetings with Historic Preservation Groups

Chairman Wehrli indicated that another group meeting would occur in winter 2022-2023.

Chairman Wehrli discussed having Commission meetings at sites in Kendall County to gain a greater understanding of Kendall County. He asked attendees to send suggested meeting locations to Mr. Asselmeier.



Historic Structure Survey Training

Ken Itle, of Wiss, Janney, Elstner Associates, Inc. (WJE), explained the deliverables. The deliverables are the narrative report and survey forms. Mr. Itle explained the research methodology using plat maps and atlases. He explained the importance of visiting each site, noting existing buildings, and noting building materials. He provided a sample form for a site visit; the information is for the exterior only. Foundations should be noted; every structure should be documented, if visible, including dog houses and swimming pools.

Discussion occurred regarding pre-visit communication; a postcard could be mailed to property owners.

Discussion occurred regarding steps for visiting a property, including knocking on the door and explaining the process. If a property owner does not want you on the property, leave the property. If the property has no trespassing signs and looks unfriendly, don't go on the property. Brochures will also be handed out onsite.

Twelve (12) to fifteen (15) properties can be visited during one (1) day. A site visit lasts between fifteen (15) and thirty (30) minutes, starting around 9:00 a.m. There would be sixteen (16) total days to survey both townships. Volunteers would be asked to help between three (3) and five (5) days. Discussion occurred regarding how volunteers and WJE staff coordinate visits. The hope is to have the field work completed by Christmas.

Mr. Itle explained which properties were identified for surveying, including churches, cemeteries, and small bridges.

Discussion occurred regarding why Bristol and Kendall Townships were selected and the plans to do the other townships. Discussion occurred regarding WJE's surveys in Will County.

Discussion occurred regarding Boulder Hill and the history of Bristol Township.







Good morning,

Let me introduce myself - I am the Chair of the Plainfield Historic Preservation Commission and I tried to call all of you on Friday afternoon, August 5 to speak to you about the possibility of co-sponsoring a **CAMP** on Historic Preservation in 2023 with Plainfield's Historic Preservation Commission for you, your Commissioners and other staff interested in learning more about historic preservation.

I was able to speak to Jayne Bernhard, the staff person at Joliet and Valeria Tarka, the new staff person at Oswego & introduced myself to both of them & told them that I would be sending out this email to the four area historic preservation Commissions - Joliet, Kendall County, Oswego & Will County. I have previously spoken to Matt Asselmeier & attended several meetings with the Kendall County HPC before they became one of Illinois' newest CLG communities & have spoken & worked with the new Chair of the Will County HPC, Dan Seggebruch.

I was appointed to Plainfield's Historic Preservation Commission in the Fall of 2004 after having retired from teaching high school for 34 years. My wife & I built a new house in Plainfield & moved there in 2002. As a teacher, I taught World History, World Geography, U.S. History & World Cultures. I was appointed Vice-Chairperson & was the only retired member of the Commission. Because of my interest in history, my research into local properties became valuable for the Commission & I have continued to pursue that passion & try to educate local residents about preservation & dispel pre-conceived & misinformation about historic preservation when ever & where ever possible. Initially I was a novice when it came to historic preservation however through mentoring by the Commission's former Chair & attending meetings & CAMPs I have become more knowledgeable & passionate about the subject. Since most of my Commissioners have full-time jobs & I am retired, I have considerably more time to do research where needed for the Commission, co-write Landmark nominations & work with our Staff on preservation business.

I attended my first **CAMP** training session at the 2013 all-day Illinois State Convention for preservation in Evanston and in the Spring of 2015, Plainfield & Will County cosponsored a CAMP at the I & M Canal Office in Lockport on a Saturday morning which is the home of the Will County Historical Society. In 2017, Plainfield, Will County & Joliet sponsored another CAMP in downtown Plainfield at the 1892 Masonic Block Building. We had Commissioners & Staff from those 3 Commissions, plus other

Commissioners from Kankakee, Oswego, Lockport & Kendall County. Both **CAMPs** lasted all day with lunch & were partially paid by a CLG Grant from the State & National Park Service with the remainder paid by the 3 attending Commissions.

I recently spoke to Marie Snyder, the Program Manager for the National Alliance of Preservation Commissions (NAPC) to inquire about the cost of having a CAMP next year. The cost for a 2023 face-to-face CAMP with 3 presenters from NAPC covering 6 topics (plus we can choose those topics) that fits best with the needs of our Commissions would be \$7,000 & a CLG grant in the past covered 70% of the cost or \$4,900 & the remaining \$2,100 would be oaid by the 3 Commissions at \$700 each & if we had 4 or 5 commissions attending, that cost would be lower. Camps normally accommodate 30 & extra attendees would pay \$35 each plus the cost of lunch - but we will worry about that later since our previous experiences has been that not all Commissioners/staff are able to attend either during the week or wish to give up a Saturday since most Commissioners work full-time during the week. I do know that in Plainfield we have 2 new Staff & possibly 1 new Commissioner & our Commission was recently been reduced to 7 from 9 & I believe that Oswego also has a Commission of 7, Kendall County has 6, Joliet & Will County each have 9.

Right now I am asking which Commissions might be interested in cosponsoring with Plainfield to create a CAMP Meeting in 2023? - Send me an email or give me a call on my cedll.

2017 CAMP PROPOSAL Plainfield, Joliet, Will County Historic Preservation Commissions

Timeline:

We have secured a site to host the 2017 **CAMP** presentation – we will use the second floor of the 1892 Masonic Block Building in Plainfield's Downtown Historic District which was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in September 2013. The building was built by the Masons, who are still the owners – construction was begun in March 1892 and completed in November 1892. The building was recently restored to its original 1892 appearance and was designated a local Village Landmark in October 2014.

For lunch we would like to walk the attendees and CAMP personnel over to the recently restored 1899 Opera House and eat in the restaurant that occupies the second floor of the 1899 building along with the 2016 addition that houses the kitchen, bathrooms, elevator and offices

Particpants:

The three Historic Preservation Commissions listed above have agreed to sponsor a Commission Assistance & Mentoring Program (CAMP) for 2017. Each Commission has 9 members plus a staff person to provide logistical support and who acts as a Liaison between the Commission and their local Governmental body to which they provide the necessary expertise in historic preservation. There are a total of 30 possible participants that could ideally be included in the CAMP presentation, however it is unlikely that a date for our proposed CAMP could possibly accommodate every member. Once the date has been set, the chairs of each Commission can poll their members to ascertain the number of Commissioners that can attend and should we have less than 30 participants, we will reach out to other area local Historic Preservation Commissions and invite their members to fill our quota of 30 participants for this CAMP:

Oswego HPC Kendall County HPC Lockport HPC Naperville HPC

Aurora HPC Kane County HPC St. Charles HPC Geneva HPC

In April 2015, the Historic Preservation Commissions of Will County and Plainfield sponsored a **CAMP** in Lockport at the I&M Canal Office which is the home of the Will County Historical Society. Five Commissioners from Plainfield attended that **CAMP** and 3 other Commissioners had attended the **CAMP** program at the State Conference held in Evanston in 2013. Within the past eighteen months, the Plainfield Historic Preservation Commission has added two new Commissioners and has gained a new Staff person who has very limited formal training in Historic Preservation after our previous staff person took a new position in Antioch, Illinois. Our Commissioners who have attended these **CAMP** presentations have learned a great deal and are willing to attend these programs provided they can adjust their schedules; thus we have a need and are hoping to get everyone on board with this Camp. The Joliet HPC is looking for a new planner/secretary and hopefully their new hire might be onboard when we convene this **CAMP** and their current staff person along with their Commissioners would also benefit. The Staff Person for Will County HPC worked with the Plainfield HPC to set up the Spring 2015 conference and when we received the email notifying the CLG Commissions of this CAMP opportunity, we agreed to look for a third local sponsor and ask our Commissioners if they might be interested in attending.

Budget:

The 3 sponsoring Commissions will equally share the 30% local share expense of the **CAMP** or \$700 each and each Commission's attending participants will have their meals paid by their respective communities; the cost for each meal would be between \$10 - \$20 each. The probabilities exist that we would need to invite additional Commissioners from neighboring CLG communities to reach our quota of 30 participants since finding that date when all Commissioners would be available on any given Saturday. We would invite Commissioners from those Commissions listed under Participants to give them the opportunity to benefit from this experience and have their Community pay for their individual Commissioner's workshop fee and lunch

Award categories and number of awards to be given: Nominations may be for a structure (residential or commercial) that has undergone exterior or interior preservation, restoration, rehabilitation, adaptive reuse, landscape restoration or sympathetic additions OR for a person or group that exhibits dedication to the field of historic preservation OR for a site that possesses importance to the history of Kendall County, State of Illinois, or the United States.

The HPC reserves the right to offer one or more awards based on the quality of submitted nominations. The HPC also reserves the right to offer zero awards.

Award designation may simply be: "2023 Historic Preservation Award (s)," "Person of the Year," or "Project of the Year."

Award Review and Selection Criteria:

Preservation/Restoration

- Only completed projects shall be considered.
- Historic character and features of the property shall be retained and preserved.
- Features, spaces, and spatial relationships that characterize a property shall be retained.
- Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property shall be preserved.
- Original materials shall be retained (example: slate roof repair/replacement, removal of artificial siding, repair/restoration of wood siding).
- Historic materials and features shall be repaired rather than replaced.
- When material is replaced, the new shall match the old in composition, design, color and texture.
- Landscape and site features original to the site shall be preserved.

Architecturally Compatible New Addition:

- Only completed projects shall be considered.
- New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction shall not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property.
- The new work shall be differentiated from the old but shall be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment.

HPC Commissioner Award Selection Procedure

- **Meeting**: Each Commissioner secretly ranks applications by number of applications. For example, if there are 7 applications then you they are ranked 1-7 with #1 being the highest ranking.
- Rankings are discussed.
- Recommendation made on number of awards to be bestowed followed by a recommendation and formal vote on awardees.
- A tie may result in a second vote for one.

20 Historic sites to be marked

Kendall County Record July 1, 1976

Plaques will be placed at 20 locations in Kendall County this year marking important spots in county history.

In Yorkville, a plaque will be placed on the lawn of the County Office Building marking the spot the time capsule is buried.

The site of the first Kendall County Courthouse will be marked with a plaque. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Ketchum now stands on the property at the northeast comer of State Street and Fox Road in Yorkville. A private dwelling on the site was rented shortly after Kendall County was formed in 1841. At the time, \$30 was set aside for fitting up the courthouse. The original building consisted of a brick basement and a frame second story. It was tom down in 1898. That first courthouse, which housed county government until 1845, was the scene of the county's first murder trial and also the only slave auction in the county.

A plaque honoring the first mill in the county will be placed in the Yorkville City Park where that mill's stone now sits. The mill was started by John Schneider in 1834 along the Blackberry Creek.

The Yorkville Congregational Church, West Center Street, Yorkville, will be marked with a plaque as the oldest standing church in the county. The church traces its history back to early settlers in Pavillion in 1834. The present sanctuary of the church was dedicated in June 1855.

A plaque will also be placed on the Kendall County Record building, 222 S. Bridge St., Yorkville. It is the oldest existing business in the county. John R. Marshall printed the first issue of the Record on May 7, 1864 in the building, which now houses the Variety Shop. In 1868, he built the present building. Marshall's son, Hugh, and grandson's, John and Robert, published the paper until 1966, when it was sold to Howard Pine. Present owners are Jeff and Kathy Farren. Among early items in the Record were Civil War news and black-bordered pages announcing the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln in April, 1865.

A plaque in Oswego will mark it as the oldest village. It was laid out in 1835 by L.F. Arnold and L.B. Judson, who planned to name it Hudson. The name was changed in a vote by early settlers, some of whom were from Oswego, N.Y.

Oswego was the county seat from 1845 to 1864. Petitions had been sent to the state legislature asking for the change in January 1845 and in an election Sept. 1, 1845, Oswego received a majority of the votes for county seat. A contract was let to Luke W. Swan for the construction of a courthouse there, which was paid off in 1852. By 1859,

pressure grew to move the county seat to a more central location and in 1862 a site in Yorkville was chosen. The move was completed in 1864 after which the Oswego courthouse building was used as a village hall and later a school. Now the site is the location of the post office, bank and city park. Both Oswego plaques are at this site.

Two Indian reservations will be marked with Boulders, the Waish-kee-shaw in NaAuSay and Mo-ah-way in Oswego Township. Waish-kee-shaw, a Potowatomi, was the wife of David Laughton who it is believed settled in the county about 1828. She was granted one and a half section at or near the source of the Aux Sable Creek in an 1829 treaty. Mo-ah-way was granted one quarter section adjoining the north edge of Waish-kee-shaw land in the same treaty. There is no information available now on Mo-ah-way, but it is believed that the name was a woman's.

The Chicago to Ottawa Trail will be marked with a plaque on the Ray Vickery farm on Chicago Road in Seward Township. This stagecoach route was established by Dr. John L. a weekly stage from Chicago to Galena through Little Rock. That route "is marked with a plaque on the Charles O. Smith property on Galena Road.

The home of Jean Morrison, Joliet Road, Lisbon, will be marked with a plaque, as it was once a stagecoach stop.

The V. F. W. hall in Plattville site will be marked as the site of the National Guard Armory.

Representatives of the Underground Railroad In Kendall County who lived in Lisbon will be commemorated at the Lisbon Grade School. Some of the early families believed to have worked on the underground were Bushnell, Kendall, Hills, Russell, Kellogg, Holderman, Sherrill, Wright, Caton and Moore families.

A plaque to mark the site of the first settlers' cabin, built by Robert Beresford, will go on the Gerald Vogen farm In Section 31 of Big Grove Township, in the far southwest comer of the county. Beresford arrived in the county in 1826 and settled In Holderman's Grove.

Another plaque has been dedicated at the Pearl Coomer home, 102 Van Buren in Newark, the site of the first store in the county. The store was opened by George Hollenback in 1831. Called Hollenback's Trading Post, it was burned down during the Blackhawk War.


The first schoolhouse in the county was opened in a log cabin at Pavillion in 1834. Classes were taught by C.B. Alvard. The plaque to mark this first school will be at the site of Pavillion.

A plaque will be placed on the Plano Molding building in Plano because the company had its beginnings in the early reaper company in the county's first factory.

WSPY's radio station will have a plaque as the county's first radio station.

The Illinois Midland Railroad, which ran for two miles between Newark and Millington In about 1917, will be marked with a plaque.


Roger Brown and Miesian Metropolitanism




Now Inside the House: Every Line Is A Decision

David Wallace Haskins: Landscape + Art


