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<u>Defendant sentenced to 20 years in prison for multiple violent</u> <u>crimes committed over the last several years.</u>

Kendall County State's Attorney Eric Weis announced that Noah Rodriguez (dob: 09/08/97) formerly of Aurora, Illinois was sentenced to a total of 20 years in prison for multiple violent felony offenses dating back to 2016. Rodriguez entered his final plea of guilty to the charge of Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault last month and was sentenced to 8 years in prison. Rodriguez will have to serve at least 85% of his sentence before being eligible for mandatory supervised release. Additionally, he will have to register as a sex offender for life. Rodriguez was charged after an investigation revealed that Rodriguez had non-consensual sexual intercourse with a victim who was unable to give consent. Rodriguez denied knowing the victim, however DNA evidence recovered from the victim proved he was the offender.

This case is the last of four other felony cases which Rodiguez has committed and has been sentenced on since 2016. Rodriguez was sentenced to 2 years in prison for theft of government property when, while out on bond, cut his ankle bracelet, which was never recovered and fled for several months. Rodriguez was later charged and sentenced to 6 more years in prison for strangling his estranged wife. He will have to serve 85 % of this sentence as well. And finally, while in custody at the Kendall County jail, Rodiguez violently assaulted two other inmates and was given an additional 4 years in custody. Rodriguez now faces additional federal charges unrelated to his cases in Kendall County.

Weis commented, "This defendant is a perfect example of someone who needs to be incarcerated for a long time. Rodriguez has a history of violent offenses and even when he is in custody, he resorts to violence. He will now have the next twenty years to realize his violent actions have long term consequences." The cases were prosecuted by State's Attorney Weis. Attorney Brian Erwin represented Rodriguez.
