CONVICTED FELON GETS 30 YEARS FOR ATTEMPT MURDER

Kendall County State's Attorney Eric Weis announced that Quinton J. McKee (dob: 11/25/1997) formerly of Bolingbrook, Illinois, was sentenced to 30 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections back in March of 2024 by the Honorable Robert Pilmer. McKee was convicted by a Kendall County jury of Attempt First Degree Murder, Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm, Unlawful Possession of Weapon by a Felon, and Aggravated Unlawful Use of Weapons on October 20, 2023.

According to Weis, on May 31, 2022, the Montgomery Police Department received 911 calls regarding shots fired. During the investigation into this matter, it was learned by police that McKee had been involved in shooting at two different vehicles of victims. McKee had discharged a firearm at the vehicle of his estranged 19-year-old girlfriend after threatening to kill her and turn her car into "swiss cheese." McKee then discharged his firearm 3 times at the vehicle driven by his girlfriend's father who fearing for his daughter's safety had attempted to intervene after McKee fired on his daughter and was following his daughter.

McKee was sentenced to 30 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on the charge of Attempt First Degree Murder, 10 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections for Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm, 8 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on the charge of Unlawful Possession of Weapon by a Felon, and 5 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on the charges of Aggravated Unlawful Use of Weapon. On the most serious charge, McKee is required to serve 85 percent of his 30 year sentence in the Illinois Department of Corrections. Following his release from prison, he will be required to serve 3 years of mandatory supervised release, formerly known as parole. Weis stated "Without the commitment of the several law enforcement agencies involved in this investigation, the victims of this crime would not have seen justice. The Court in sentencing McKee to 30 years in prison sends a message that this type of conduct will not be tolerated in Kendall County."

The case was prosecuted by Assistant State's Attorneys Andrea Boyle and Jennifer Cusack. McKee was represented by Kurt Gustafson and Jason Majer.
